She is the author of bone, her first chapbook of poetry published in 1993; continental drift, published by West End Press in 1999; her beckoning hands, published by Word Poetry in July, 2014 and winner of the 2015 American Book Award; and one inch punch, published by Word Poetry in October, 2018. She received her MFA in Poetics & Writing from New College of CA, and was the recipient of an artist residency at Montalvo. She has also performed for and taught creative writing workshops with elementary and high school youth. In addition to being a mother of three, Arlene has been working full-time since 1996 as an arts education and grants program manager for the City of San Jose Office of Cultural Affairs.
